### Challenges

- How do you include full community engagement in short term annual budget cycle?
- Same key individuals taking part
- How do we move to mainstreaming PB within existing budgets?
- How do we get buy in from services?
- Setting in 1%
- How do you enable the community to be able to talk/pitch/present?
- Digital poverty – how do you ensure interaction?
- How do you find out community issues before PB events?
  - o The disconnect between community perception of needs and external perceptions
  - o How do you ask the questions?
- How do people articulate their needs if they are ill-equipped to do so? e.g. because of life circumstances?
- Budgeting? – how do you open budgets up?
- Finance for tools (digitalisation)
- Voting twice (trust?)
- Data protection and validation
